September’s program was well attended by residents interested in learning more about Seabiscuit Wildlife Shelter with Mary Ellen Rogers (and Benson).



Winning PBS show ran for 8 years, fascinating viewers with stories of natural wonders throughout the Carolinas and beyond.



About Migration:

Millions of birds migrate over coastal North Carolina each year, with recent estimates showing hundreds of thousands to several million birds crossing the state on a given night during peak migration periods.

Tips during this migratory season:

- After 9pm, try using your binoculars and look at the moon. You may see flocks of birds. It's an amazing experience! You may also hear them call.
- Turn off outside lights after 10pm to help birds navigate at night. Try to use only down-shielded or motion-sensor lights on your property.
- Keep your feeders clean and full to assist birds with food along their way. Many birds will stop during the day to rest, eat, and drink.
- Birdbaths should be cleaned and full as well. Birds prefer clean water.
- Plant native shrubs that produce fall berries such as American Beautyberry. Fall fruits and berries help sustain migrating birds.
- Maintaining a bird-friendly habitat will increase the likelihood of visitors.
- Keep cats inside to prevent attacks on tired or resting birds

We are in the peak bird migration season as well as being located in the Atlantic Flyway. Right now, you have some incredible opportunities to see scores of birds making their way along coastal Brunswick County. To help you understand this opportunity,





New Website Launch!


We are proud to announce the launch of our website this month. Although a work in progress, we hope you will check out what we've put together so far and offer feedback. What would you like to see there?
